Upcoming Events Calendar - Pg 15 Our October 17th General Membership Dinner Meeting was very enjoyable. The dinner entrées were both truly excellent and we were happy to have 30+attending. Thanks to Terry Blatchley for providing us such a terrific evening.

Our speaker, Scott Baker a Fisheries Specialist from North Carolina Sea Grant provided information regarding efforts that touch saltwater anglers, boaters and outdoor enthusiasts.

Scott helps the commercial and recreational fishing communities understand and apply the latest in fisheries management, research and technology. His latest activities include pilot testing electronic monitoring systems and by catch reduction devices in commercial fisheries, as well as developing and

catch reduction devices in commercial fisheries, as well as developing and testing fish descending devices for use in the marine recreational fishing sector.



Scott gave us a smattering of literally every aspect of his exposure to the efforts put forth on behalf of commercial and recreational fishing interests on the Carolina coast and inland. He was an eloquent spokesman for the continuing viability of fisheries in the Carolinas. Of times maligned for inhibiting free and unregulated fishing in our native

waters, it is obvious that this organization is one of a staggering number of multiple federal and state entities working daily in technically complex and scientifically oriented activities intent on inhibiting wanton overfishing and literal eradication of numbers of species of fish both migratory as well as endemic.

He currently serves as President of the American Fisheries Society Tidewater Chapter and Chair of the South Atlantic Fishery Management Council's Information and Education Advisory Panel. He holds a master's in oceanography and coastal sciences from Louisiana State University and a biological science technician for NOAA Fisheries in Panama City, FL.

Scott was very effective in impressing an attentive Power Squadron of the importance of incessant and consistently disciplined management of the aquatic resources of our region. Thank Jim Blatchley for uncovering and bringing Scott Baker to our meeting, raising our conscience to this subject.

#### **Aides to Navigation Sunset Cruise**

Mike and I had the pleasure of attending the Aids to Navigation Sunset Cruise sponsored by the Fort Macon Sail & Power Squadron on October 19. It included an educational program and dinner at the Sanitary Restaurant in Morehead City followed by a sunset cruise on the Carolina Princess. The purpose was to help the attendees understand what navigational markers (buoys and beacons) tell boaters, and how to

identify them day and night on charts and on the water. The squadron holds this seminar every two years. (Mike and I had been on a boat cruise to Morehead City and Beaufort the week prior so this was a timely topic for us). There were 74 folks in attendance with 20 of those being non Power Squadron Members.

The educational lecture was given by the Squadron's Education Officer, Joe Murphy. Joe was a knowledgeable and entertaining speaker. Most boaters know the terminology "red, right, returning" which means that you keep the red aids to the right of your boat when you are returning from open sea or proceeding upstream. That's a great start but there is so much more to them. Red aids are even numbered and triangle shaped. Green aids are odd numbered and square shaped. (It's very handy to understand the shapes as you may be able to see that long before the letters or numbers.) Buoys are aids that float on top of the water but are moored to the bottom of the body of water. A buoy with a cylindrical shape and a conical top is referred to as a "nun". A buoy with a cylindrical shape and a flat top is called a "can". Beacons are aids that are permanently fixed, most commonly to the bottom of a body of water. ". A buoy can be identified on a chart because the text identifying them is in italics and the symbol appears to be floating while the symbol for a beacon is written in regular (non-italic) font.

It was daylight when we left for our cruise on the Carolina Princess and it was dark when we returned. We were provided with a chart excerpt for the Morehead City area printed on waterproofed paper (especially handy because it was raining a little) and a little red light so we could read the chart. We were helped to understand what we were seeing on the water by a squadron member speaking over the sound system of the boat. It was fun to identify the characteristics of the flashing lights. For example, "Q" on a chart means quick flashing which is about 60 times per minute. F (2+1) R 6 on a chart means that the red light flashes quickly twice then again once and then there is a break with this sequence repeating every 6 seconds (we learned that this particular pattern is reserved for a preferred channel marker). It was particularly interesting to see how a spot light shining on the aids really lit them up. We were easily able to see the aid shape and number (or letters) due to the reflective material on the aids. (Note to self that we need to get a good spotlight for the boat).





We also really enjoyed seeing the lights that mark the ranges that the big ships coming from sea use to identify the entrance to the Beaufort Inlet. They line up these bright lights to ensure that they are in the middle of the channel, and there are three sets of different lights/markers that they use. It was also interesting to see just how many flashing lights that there were and it was very easy to lose track of where we were. Navigating at night (especially in this port) isn't for the faint of heart and it isn't anything that we plan to try ourselves anytime soon. There is a lot of "skinny water" in the Morehead/Beaufort area and squadron folks were happy to point out where many boaters had run aground on sand bars.

The people of the Fort Macon Squadron were very warm and inviting. Mike and I made friends with a couple who are going to take us fishing in the spring. I highly recommend this very interesting and engaging seminar to members of our squadron.

It was very well done and I'd love to attend with you next time it is offered!

The United States Power Squadrons/America's Boating Club Membership now includes valuable new travel safety benefits from DAN Boater (DB). This new worldwide safety and travel benefit is different from other new benefits. This is a membership based benefit and is automatically added into your membership.

There has been published information on this from National but we felt it important to highlight this change since it is an "automatic enrollment". I'm sure we'll hear much more about this from National over the next couple of months.

Here is how it works....

This new safety and travel benefit is offered to current individual and family members beginning mid-October 2019 Free initially. These benefits will be automatically added to your USPS/America's Boating Club membership at no charge to you. You may begin using the benefits immediately and continue using them through the remainder of your current membership period.

At the time of each member's renewal, the \$25 for the DAN Boater benefit will be included as a separate line item on your renewal invoice. If we don't wish to continue the DB benefit, just delete the charge from your payment.

These travel benefits originate when you are over 50 miles from your home and cover you and your family for worldwide travel on water or land. What's included?

- 24/7 Emergency Hotline
- Medical Information Line for non-emergency travel health questions
- Worldwide Medical Evacuation Assistance (up to \$150,000)
- Worldwide Medical Repatriation Assistance (up to \$25,000)
- Search and Rescue Expense Reimbursement (up to \$25,000)
- Free Travel Health and Safety Guides
- Travel Assistance Services including prescription assistance, medical and legal referrals, the emergency return of traveling companion or dependent children, and more




