What an interesting evening. Linda provided an engaging community speaker, Chief Phil Rollinson of the Washington Police Department. We are happy to report that both meal choices by WYCC were very good. Chief Phil Rollinson has a bachelor's Degree from Mount Olive University and a

Chief Phil Rollinson has a bachelor's Degree from Mount Olive University and a graduate of the 136th Administrative Officers Course at Southern Police Institute at University of Louisville.



Phil began his law enforcement career with the Nags Head Police Dept where he worked for 2-½ years as a patrol officer. In 2002, he transitioned to the Greenville Police Dept for 17 years as a patrol officer and detective working gangs, criminal intelligence and large-scale narcotics. He went back to patrol as a sergeant in his last 5 years in Greenville. Phil came to Washington as the investigation division captain and was promoted in April 2023 to his current role as Chief.

Chief Rollinson clearly enjoys his career choice, finds it rewarding and appreciates the opportunities he has had after leaving Nags Head. The make up of the City's Police Department reporting to him is 16 patrol officers, 3 detectives, 2 captains, 4 dispatchers and one housing liaison to the department. His department officers are equipped with very good body cams and vehicle cameras. His officers will be undergoing additional illicit drug training, such as fentanyl and xylazine (a veterinary drug), plus the use of Narcan.

Phil encouraged questions from our group and compared violent crime and gang problems that are much higher in Greenville and for example in Wilmington than Washington (*thankfully*).

When asked what his biggest challenges are he quickly identified... The crimes, some violent, by kids 15-16-17 years old. They have nothing to do and are attracted to criminal activities. The other challenge is hiring of police officers. He cited statistics showing recruitment efforts and applications are very low compared to just a couple of years ago.

He covered the crime issues around the waterfront and docks, he indicated that it really wasn't an issue at this time. There may be minor disturbances typically by kids at night. The City Police does not have a marine unit and he clarified that their responsibility is only the stretch of water from the trestle bridge to the old 17 bridge and doesn't merit that type of investment. If needed they call the fire department or the Sherrif for assist.

He was quick to respond when asked what can we do for them.... continue to teach boating safety, boating rules and responsibility!

Summer seems to be in full swing now. We haven't had any appreciable rain in June, but hopefully, we will get some after this writing, because we sure need it.



Boat Sober this July 4th

Every year, law enforcement agencies engage in a heightened enforcement weekend around the July 4th holiday as part of <u>Operation Dry Water</u>. The year-round awareness and enforcement campaign aims to reduce the number of alcohol- and drug-related accidents through increased recreational boater awareness.

Law enforcement agencies are asked to increase BUI enforcement during the targeted enforcement weekend of Operation Dry Water, July 4 - 6, as well as work with their local media, businesses and recreational boaters to spread the message and raise awareness of the dangers of boating under the influence during the heightened enforcement weekend and all year long. America's Boating Club encourages boat operators to plan their celebrations responsibly and to communicate these plans with everyone who will be aboard. Those conversations may be uncomfortable, but they are important.

Dangers of BUI

Alcohol use is the number one contributor to fatal boating accidents. The July 4th weekend when the hot weather and festivities often involve water activities and alcohol—presents heightened risks that affect boat operators and passengers alike, including

- impaired judgment, balance, vision, and reaction time
- magnified impact of the sun, wind, noise, vibration, and motion stressors that are common to the boating environment
- increased fatigue and likelihood for slips, falls overboard, and other dangerous accidents
- increased susceptibility to the effects of cold-water immersion

The risks can be managed when everyone agrees to reserve alcohol consumption for when they are safely back from enjoying on-the-water activities.

"Boating is fabulous fun until—in a totally preventable moment—it isn't," reported the Chief Commander of United States Power Squadrons, America's Boating Club. "Fortunately, we can all do our part to ensure this 4th of July only creates good memories for ourselves and those who are boating around us."
